CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC:

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 2021 continued to offer some challenges for the Jamestown Police Department and Jamestown Municipal Court. There was an enormous backlog of 2020 trials and judicial proceedings which were held in 2021. These late prosecutions created a strain on the officers and their schedules. There were also several officers who became ill with the COVID-19 virus, which created other scheduling hardships in keeping shifts adequately staffed. Fortunately, none of our officers suffered serious disease.

There continues to be equipment and supply chain issues that affect the Jamestown Police Department's ability to conduct day to day operations.

In addition, there is a backlog of post-sentence fingerprint requirements due to the Municipal Court delays and the social distancing guidelines created by the pandemic.

The Police Department also focused on completing trainings and re-certifications on different Law Enforcement subject matters, which were not available in 2020. The entire staff at the Jamestown Police Department continues to look forward to the endemic phase of COVID-19 to return life to normal.

PUBLIC RELATIONS:

Identity theft and scam education continue to be very popular and requested classes are given by the Detective Division of the Jamestown Police Department.

Other presentations were given to various groups covering traffic laws, domestic violence, duties of police officer, sexual assault or other police related topics as requested. At the Jamestown Police Department, we feel it is necessary to be involved with the community and interact with them and we will continue to do that.

The Jamestown Police Department's Facebook page is used to make public service announcements, offer crime prevention tips and as a public relations tool to make people aware of the programs and activities that the Police Department and/or officers are involved in. Our Facebook page showed a decrease in the number of people reached for the first time since we started the page, with 87,178 people reached in 2021 compared to 138,496 in 2020. However, our page's "likes" increased to 4,971 in 2021 compared to 2,224 in 2020. The number of people following our page has again increased from 4,284 in 2020 to 5,376 in 2021. It is apparent that our Facebook page remains an excellent tool for interacting with the citizens of Jamestown.

Police Department tours offer the opportunity to become informed on the operation of the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Communications Center and the Stutsman County Correctional Center.

GAMING ENFORCEMENT:

The department's gaming enforcement program works towards the goal of ensuring that those who conduct or play the games of chance in Jamestown are protected by the state gaming rules. To accomplish these goals, the Jamestown Police Department, working with the ND State Gaming Office, review complaints of gaming violations.

BICYCLES:

In 2021 there were a total of 4 bicycle licenses sold. There were 20 bikes reported stolen with a total of 51 abandoned or stolen bikes recovered in 2021.

2021 Canine Year End Report

The Jamestown Police Department K9 Team is comprised of myself and K9 Odin. The K9 team responded to 12 calls for service (CFS) this year assisting several agencies to include: North Dakota Highway Patrol and the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office.

The K9 Team responds to assist in narcotics sniffs (on vehicles and residences) or in the patrol aspect (i.e. burglar alarms, to locate subject who are wanted).

The K9 Team has played a big role with the Special Operations Team (SOT) where The K9 Team can be used as another tool to assist in locating subjects inside a residence. The K9 Team as also assisted other facilities such as the James River Correctional Center (JRCC), Stutsman County Correctional Center (SCCC), and the Jamestown Public Schools for narcotics sniffs inside the facilities.

The K9 Team's CFS breakdown is as follows:

-Schools:	1
-Jail/Prison:	2
-Vehicle/Building sniffs:	6
-Buildings/Patrol Aspect:	3

The K9 team is always ready to assist with the Special Operations Team, but depending on the call, we may not be utilized. This past year, the team was not utilized in SOT Callouts, but we continue to train with the team so the K9 team is prepared and the team members are used to having the K9 on a call if needed.

Every year the K9 Team needs to be certified and is currently certified through the National Police Canine Association (NPCA). The K9 Team is certified in Narcotics Detection (Methamphetamine, Marijuana, Cocaine, and Heroin), and Patrol (Obedience, recalling, apprehension, and a verbal release after an apprehension).

The K9 Team is continually training to better serve.

2021 SCHOOL PROGRAMS:

The School Resource Officer of the Jamestown Police Department gave 47 presentations to school age children in 2021. The following programs were included in those presentations.

Meet a Police Officer: Students meet a Police Officer and learn about good citizenship, responsibility and the duties of Police Officers.

Beware of Strangers: Instructions to students about safety with strangers. Topics include who a stranger is, rides from strangers and good and bad touches.

Halloween Safety: Instructions on Halloween safety rules. Topics include traffic safety, costumes, treats, stranger safety and Halloween courtesy.

Crime Prevention: Program designed to teach crime prevention, crime detection and crime reporting. Topics include the job of a Police Officer, how to detect, prevent and report crimes.

Bike Safety: Program designed to teach safe bike riding. Topics include bike traffic safety rules, accident prevention, locking and licensing bikes.

Home Alone Safety: Reviews the safety skills children need when they are home alone. Topics include crime prevention, first aid and the use of emergency phone number 911.

Arson Awareness Program: An informative look at the dangers involved in the misuse of lighters and matches. Students are reminded that matches and lighters are dangerous tools and when they are misused, they can cause injury, death and the destruction of property. Students are advised to receive proper instruction on how to use matches and lighters from an adult. Examples of the misuse of fire are given along with safety information on how to prevent fires.

School Resource Officer Report

2021

In January 2021, I became the School Resource Officer for the Jamestown Police Department. This school year I worked as the SRO January 2021- May 2021 and August 2021- December 2021. I work in seven different schools which include five elementary schools, Jamestown Middle School and Jamestown High School.

My office is at the Jamestown High School, where I am equipped with a school computer, allowing me access to all seven school cameras. I've learned, I do not get much time to spend in my office as I am always on the move going from one school to another. I try to stop by every school at least once a week to check in and see how things are going. Stopping by classrooms to say hello or watching the students while they are in gym.

I teach classes at the elementary level. These classes include, meet a police officer (Kindergarten), Latch Key Program (Home Alone Safety) (4th Grade) this class I am assisted by the Jamestown Fire Department, Halloween Safety (1st Grade), the Jamestown Fire Department assists with this class as well. Beware of Strangers (2nd Grade), Seatbelt Safety (3rd Grade), Arson Awareness (5th Grade), this class the Fire Department also assists with. Bike Safety (1st, 3rd, and 5th Grade), Summer Safety (Kindergarten). For these classes, each elementary school is assigned a different day Monday- Friday. I contact the secretaries and teachers to schedule the times that works for them to allow me to come and teach.

As a School Resource Officer, you are placed in many different roles. There are some students who have not had good interactions with police officers in the past. These students are my favorite to work with. I enjoy showing them I am also human, and not every police officer is a mean or scary person, and not every encounter with a police officer means you or someone else is in trouble. There are a couple of students within the Jamestown School district that I have worked with on this aspect who enjoy seeing me now. The SRO is there to build relationships with the students and staff, being seen and engaging with students and staff, preventing, and investigating crimes. All these things improve the safety of the school.

I also attended sporting events, hockey, football, basketball etc. This shows students I am invested and that I support them outside of the school day. I attend these events, not because there is a lot of crime, but it also allows the parents and family members of students to see my interactions with students and understand that my job and presence is not something to be worried about.

The SRO position is something of a community relations position. Many students, staff, parents like to know what my day-to-day activities consists of, but not even I can make a schedule for that. Every day is different, some days are slower than others and some days I am needed at multiple places at once. Each call is different. Many are labeled Disorderly Conduct, but they are never the same. The types of calls I respond to are, Disorderly Conducts (34), Unruly Juveniles (27), Tobacco Violations (8), Accidents, Juvenile Runaways (3), Welfare

Check (18), Simple Assaults (6), SRO Prevention / Education (99), Public Relations (9). There were many CFS's made but these are the most common. I had approximately 366 calls, for the time the students were in school January 2021- May 2021 and August 2021- December 2021.

I also attend Prom and Graduation. Prom I am requested by the school and prom committee to administer Breathalyzers to the students prior to them attending the dance. This is not to set anyone up, the students know this is happening prior to them attending, but to deter any negative behavior. There is a post prom party that begins approximately one hour after the dance. I am requested by the Prom Committee and TRAC to administer breathalyzers before students are allowed to attend the post prom party. For graduation, I attend the ceremony and then there is a graduation party to follow, there I administer breathalyzers before the students attend the party.

Some different activities I am included in are the Career Fairs, Market place for kids, safety day. Market Place for Kids was cancelled this year due to covid, along with Safety Day, but I look forward to participating in these in 2022.

National Night Out is a nation-wide event that is held on August 3rd. It allows for the community to come and interact with the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Jamestown Fire Department, Jamestown Rural Fire Department, Jamestown Ambulance. The community gets the opportunity to ask questions and see our gear and patrol units. There are activities and food provided for the community.

This December we had another successful year of Cops & Kids, put on by the FOP. Kids love this event as it helps with community policing. It shows kids that Police Officers are not someone to be afraid of. It also helps those families in need during the holiday season. This event is when the police officers take kids shopping for their favorite toys and things they want for Christmas. Students are selected by schools giving the SRO a list of students whom they feel need a little help that year. Anyone in the community is able to nominate families as well.

Every Wednesday, I attend the Stutsman County/ Barnes County Juvenile Drug Court Program. Juvenile Drug Court is a program for youth that have been in trouble with drug use and juvenile court deems it necessary and that the juvenile could benefit from being in this program. Most of the participants are from the Jamestown or Valley City area. Once the juvenile is in the program, they are monitored much closer by the Drug Court Team, which meets every Wednesday. The participants must complete community service hours, community programs, they are drug tested frequently and are encouraged to make positive choices. If they fail to follow the court order each week or get into further trouble, they have sanctions, which are determined by the Team. I attend this program as a representative of the Jamestown Police Department. The Jamestown participants I have rapport with from being the SRO. I believe my participation in Drug Court is a positive one for the participant, showing them. I am there to support them and encourage them to make those positive choices. This program is a national program, and in some areas, they also have Adult Drug Court. The time the participants spend in the Drug Court Program is based on how well the participant does and their willingness to not use drugs and follow the program rules.

Trainings I attended this past year to help me in my role as SRO were, Basic SRO Training, the Statewide SRO Conference, and Human Trafficking.

The School Resource Officer role is an important role for the community, Jamestown Public Schools, and the Jamestown Police Department. Without this role the officers on patrol would be responsible for responding to the calls at the school. That would make the task more difficult, leaving the rest of the community without an officer, also making it harder for each officer to get to know the students they are being called to the schools for. Having an SRO gives that officer time to get to know these students and the opportunity to build a relationship with them. Many students prefer to speak with the SRO, rather than another officer on duty, as the SRO is a familiar face.

RECORDS SECTION:

Reportable offenses (those that are reported to the FBI) were up in 2021. There were 1,048 reportable offenses in 2019, 960 offenses in 2020 and 1,093 in 2021. The following is a breakdown of the main group “A” offenses:

Assaults:

2021:179 2020: 147 2019: 168

Sex Offenses:

2021: 24 2020: 26 2019: 20

Thefts / Fraud:

2021: 456 2020: 446 2019: 412

Drug Offenses:

2021: 143 2020: 80 2019: 176

The most notable change was Possession of Drug Paraphernalia offenses increased in 2021 with 65 reportable offenses compared to 40 in 2020. Also, up in 2021, the reportable offenses for Wire Fraud went from 10 in 2020 to 32 in 2021. Reportable offenses for Unauthorized Use of Personal Information have decreased in 2021 from 41 in 2020 to 19 in 2021. The Jamestown Police Department had 55 reportable offenses categories in this section.

Adult arrests have increased in 2021 with 773 arrests in 2021 compared to 679 arrests in 2020. The following is a breakdown of the main group “A” offenses:

Thefts / Fraud:

2021: 96 2020: 118 2019: 107

Drug Offenses:

The most notable change was arrests for Contempt of Court Warrant arrests increased in 2021 at 153 arrests as compared to 114 arrests in 2020. Possession of Drug Paraphernalia arrests also increased in 2021 from 22 arrests in 2020 to 56 arrests in 2021. Other individual arrest categories were very comparable to the number received in 2020.

Juvenile referrals increased significantly in 2021 from 141 referrals in 2020 to 293 referrals in 2021. The following is a breakdown of the main group “A” offenses:

Thefts / Fraud:

2021: 26 2020: 13 2019: 24

Drug Offenses:

2021: 38 2020: 11 2019: 10

The most notable change was referrals for Unruly Juvenile have increased from 20 referrals in 2020 to 70 referrals in 2021. Other notable increases in referrals for 2021 are as follows: Runaway juvenile referrals increased by 26, Disorderly Conduct referrals increased by 22 and Ingesting a Controlled Substance referrals increased by 19. Curfew Violations for 2021 have decreased from 20 referrals in 2020 to 1 referral in 2021. Other individual referral categories were comparable to the number received in 2020.

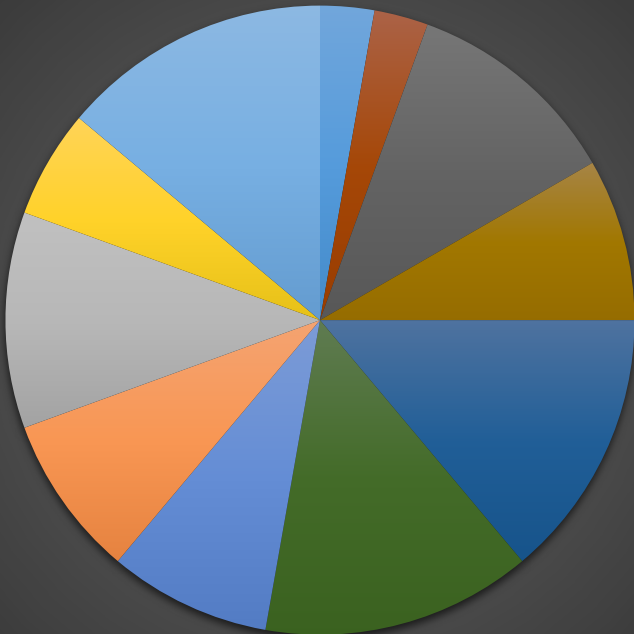

DUI Arrests by Age 2021



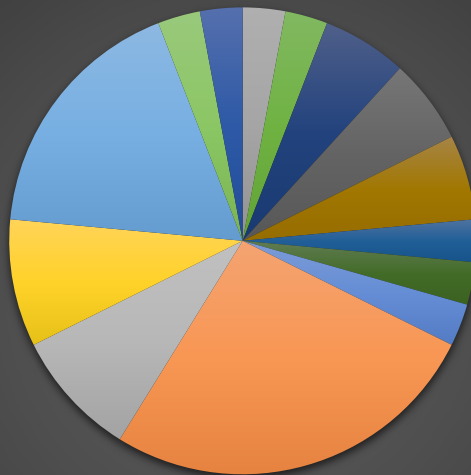

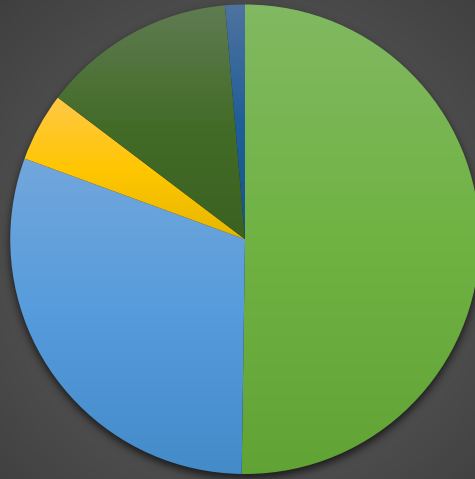

Annual Report

The Jamestown Special Operations Team (JSOT) is a combined agency Special Operations Team that has members from the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Valley City Police Department, and Barnes County Sheriff's Office, and Barnes County Ambulance Service. 2021 saw one personnel change on the team. Sergeant Brandon Dockter resigned from the Jamestown Police Department. This brought team membership to JPD with 8 officers, K9 Odin, and 1 administrative assistant, SCSO with 3 deputies, BCSO with 1 deputy, and VCPD with 1 officer. JSOT continues to utilize trained CNT negotiators from JRCC under the direction of Captain Brian Dreher. The tactical medical team consists of Dr. English and 2 Barnes County Ambulance Paramedics.

The team is currently comprised of 14 officers, K9 Odin, and 3 medical staff who are trained in special weapons and tactics to include: command and leadership, entry tactics, CQB, sniper, chemical munitions, impact munitions, breaching, armored vehicle operations, tactical medical, hostage rescue, K9 tracking and apprehension, and Tactical Combat Casualty Care.

Each year JSOT strives to provide quality training to its members. The team completed annual minimum training hours to remain a certified SWAT team set forth by the ND Special Operations Committee. New team members from 2020; Gushwa, Ohde, and Beckman completed SWAT Basic Training and the team was able to send members to Sniper Team Leader training, SKIDDS, Less Lethal Instructor training, Incident Response to Terrorist Bombings, and attend the State SOC Convention and NTOA National Convention.

In 2021 we had 1 CNT activation.

JSOT has added specialized equipment to further increase officer safety and increase our mission capabilities. JSOT added 3 UTVs and an Armored Rescue Vehicle to its capabilities.

JSOT members continue to reinstruct important topics to the patrol level personnel to better prepare officers for the increased demand put on them as the first responders to dangerous situations. JSOT members instruct the following: firearms, less lethal impact munitions, tactical medical, breaching, and CQB.

JSOT will continue to provide a well trained and dedicated group of officers to the region to respond to incidents that require specialized training and personnel. We plan on adding new members to the team in 2022 to replace personnel who have left and look to add new equipment and training to add capabilities or enhance existing capabilities for the safety of our community.

STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE YEAR END REPORT 2021

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional and multi-agency Task Force covering the counties of Stutsman, Barnes, LaMoure, Eddy, and Foster. The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is dedicated to the identification, investigation, and prosecution of the individuals involved in the use, manufacturing, and distribution of controlled substances.

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is made up of four (4) sworn Law Enforcement Officers. Deputy John Hirschert, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for six (6) years, Officer Jordan Kynaston, with the Jamestown Police Department, has been a member for one (1) year, Deputy Doug Muske, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for fourteen (14) years and is stationed in Barnes County. Special Agent Troy Kelly has been supervising the Task Force for nine (9) years. The officers are assigned to work certain areas, but the officers have been deputized in all five (5) of the counties that are part of the Task Force and must share the responsibility for all of the counties involved.

The Task Force had a total of 51 cases in 2021, which is the same from the previous year. The Task Force initiated 44 cases and assisted other agencies with 7 cases. The number of initiated cases is up from last year, but the number of assist cases is down. Of the 43 initiated cases, the Task Force had 59 arrests, and many still pending, related to drug related offenses such as Possession of Controlled Substances, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Manufacture of a Controlled Substance, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance.

In 2021, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 255 ounces of marijuana with an approximate street value of \$55,978. This number is more than three (3) times that from last year and does not include edible THC and liquid THC. Along with the 255 ounces of raw marijuana, the Task Force seized/purchased 553 grams/dosage units of concentrated THC, edible THC, and liquid THC. The Task Force has also seen an increase for those items compared to last year. During the year the Task Force investigated two (2) marijuana grows with nineteen (19) total plants being seized.

In 2021, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 29 ounces of methamphetamine with an approximate street value of \$34,800. This number is down from the amount from last year, but the Task Force has noticed a recent trend in the street value of methamphetamines becoming lower showing a higher supply in the area. Methamphetamine sales/distribution continues to be one of the larger problems in the area.

In 2021, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 306 dosage units of controlled prescription drugs, LSD, and MDMA, which is up from last year. Also seized was 368 dosage units of fentanyl which is an alarming amount compared to years prior.

In 2021, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 15 grams of Psilocybin mushrooms with an approximate street value of \$150.

In 2021, the Task Force seized two (2) grams of cocaine with an approximate street value of \$200.

In 2021, the Task Force also seized 143 grams of heroin with an approximate street value of \$16,500. That is 140 more grams than the year prior.

Besides initiating/assisting on cases, Task Force continues to provide free teaching and training in the school systems, businesses, and special interest groups throughout the area covered by the Task Force. The Task Force also continues to maintain the prescription drug take back in the area.

In summary, in 2021 the Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force initiated/assisted 51 cases involving the seizure/purchase of marijuana, methamphetamine, MDMA, psilocybin, heroin, cocaine, and prescription-controlled substances. The Task Force removed a substantial quantity of illegal narcotics, and distributors/manufacturers of those narcotics, from the streets and communities in Stutsman County, LaMoure County, Barnes County, Eddy County, and Foster County.

*Note: Several cases are still at the State Lab of Toxicology being analyzed. Actual weights would be higher. Several cases have yet to be forwarded for formal complaints. Actual arrests would be higher.

REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE

2021 ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT:

In 2021, there were a total of 800 calls pertaining to animals. The majority of these calls were to complain about animals at large or being a nuisance. 30 of these calls were regarding people being bitten by animals. 15 calls were to investigate cruelty to animals. These calls for service, along with routine patrol, resulted in 159 animals being impounded. These animals were handled as follows:

There was a total of 18 animal arrests for the year 2021.

There were 161 dog licenses and 37 cat licenses issued in 2021 as well as permits for 16 private kennels and 0 commercial kennels. The total cost of veterinary fees in 2021 was \$319.00. This includes testing cost for rabies evaluation. Other medical expenses for injured animals were covered by rescue groups.

2021 Pork Open Golf Scramble

The 2021 Pork Open Golf Scramble was held at Hillcrest Golf Course on August 21st, 2021. We had 19 teams participating this year with four players per team, equaling out to a total of 76 golfers. In years past, we've limited the number of teams to 18. This was the intention again in 2021, however a mistake was made in communication and we had 19 teams registered. With this many teams registered it was a challenge to find enough golf carts for every team. Thankfully many participants were able to bring their own or borrow some from other people not participating. There were Scratch and Handicap winners for both first and second place teams. "Orr"iginals donated windbreakers or sweatshirts for the first and second place teams.

In 2020, we were forced to change the way food was handled and didn't have the National Night Out event in early August due to COVID-19. We were able to provide the National Night Out again in 2021 and had left over hamburgers once again. The hamburgers were grilled at Hillcrest and served with chips, beans and pasta salad for all Pork Open Participants.

Each participant also received a T-Shirt with local company sponsors on the back. This has been a popular change over the past several years. Previously, door prizes were given out to each participant, but they varied in quality and value greatly. By giving out T-Shirt's, everyone's been happy and also creates another avenue to fundraise through sponsors. The T-Shirts were once again donated by Aaron Raap and Valley Plains Equipment, costing the Pork Open nothing.

During the event, I conducted a 50/50 raffle and sold mulligans to any golfer who wished to purchase them for \$5 each. These two options have also been very beneficial and fairly simple ways to raise funds with very little additional help needed. A silent auction was held after not having one in 2020. The silent auction isn't large or have big ticket items, but certainly raises funds.

The Pork Open paid for the cost of the golf carts if golfers didn't have one of their own. Hillcrest has been willing to provide the golf carts to the Pork Open at \$10 a seat instead of their regular \$15 a seat fee. Several years ago the cost of the Pork Open was raised by \$10 per golfer to pay for the T-Shirt's, but the T-Shirts were then donated. The additional cost of the golf carts was covered by the raise in entry fee. Most participants have been happy with this as there's no additional cost after their entry fee.

The proceeds go directly to the Pork Open account, which will benefit D.A.R.E. and other children's programs. It also allows the Police Department funds to purchase fun promotional items that Officers can give to children through their interactions with the public (stickers, pencils, pens, color changing cups, etc.).

Ultimately the Pork Open raised approximately \$4,000 through entry fees, 50/50 raffle, Mulligans and silent auction after paying fees to Hillcrest. As mentioned above, these proceeds are used to for school programs and items for Officers to hand out during their patrol shift when interacting with kids in the community.
