Identity theft and scam education continue to be very popular and requested classes are given by the Detective Division of the Jamestown Police Department.

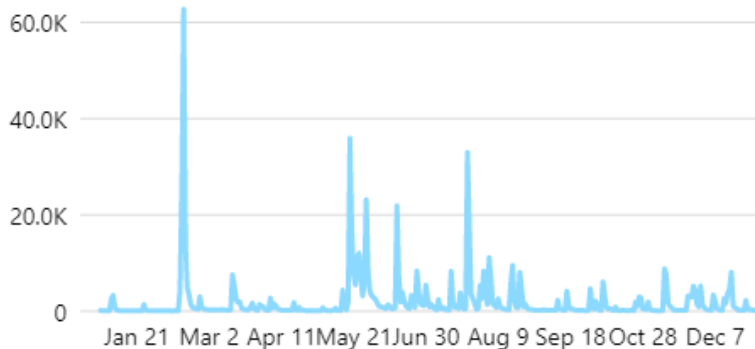
Other presentations were given to various groups covering traffic laws, domestic violence, duties of police officer, sexual assault or other police related topics as requested. At the Jamestown Police Department, we feel it is necessary to be involved with the community and interact with them and we will continue to do that.

The Jamestown Police Departments Facebook page is used to make public service announcements, offer crime prevention tips and as a public relations tool to make people aware of the programs and activities that the Police Department and/or our officers are involved in. Facebook has changed the way that they track statistics and it appears to be a more accurate reflection of what is occurring. They now list the number of occurrences for the year and the percentage of increase over the prior year. So, for 2022 the number of people reached was 276,770 an increase of 231% from 2021, Page visits was 32,227 and increase of 299% from 2021 and New Likes and Follows was 819 and increase of 12% from 2021. Based on these increases it is clear that our Facebook page continues to be an excellent tool for interacting with the citizens of Jamestown.

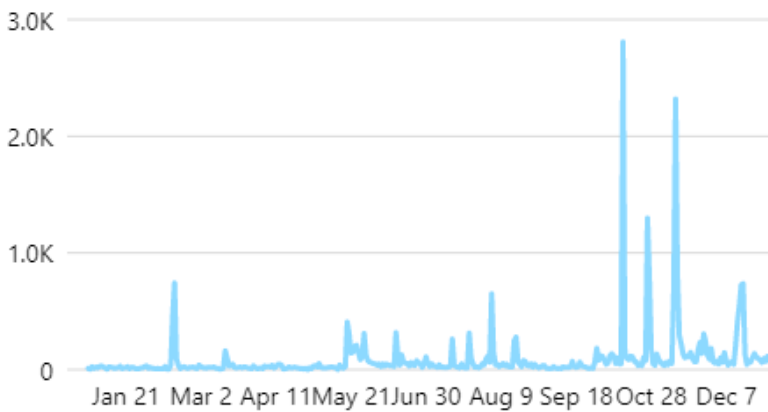

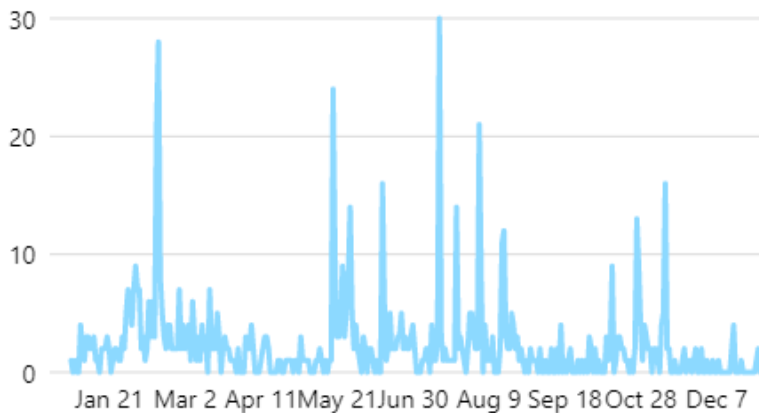

Police Department tours offer the opportunity to become informed on the operation of the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Communications Center and the Stutsman County Correctional Center.

GAMING ENFORCEMENT:

The department's gaming enforcement program works towards the goal of ensuring that those who conduct or play the games of chance in Jamestown are protected by the state gaming rules. To accomplish these goals, the Jamestown Police Department, working with the ND State Gaming Office, review complaints of gaming violations.

BICYCLES:

In 2022 there were a total of 4 bicycle licenses sold. There were 14 bikes reported stolen with a total of 24 abandoned or stolen bikes recovered in 2022.

2022 Canine Year End Report

The Jamestown Police Department K9 Team is comprised of myself and K9 Odin. The K9 team responded to 17 calls for service (CFS) this year assisting several agencies to include: North Dakota Highway Patrol and the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office.

The K9 Team responds to assist in narcotics sniffs (on vehicles and residences) or in the patrol aspect (i.e. burglar alarms, to locate subject who are wanted).

The K9 Team has played a big role with the Special Operations Team (SOT) where The K9 Team can be used as another tool to assist in locating subjects inside a residence. The K9 Team as also assisted other facilities such as the James River Correctional Center (JRCC), Stutsman County Correctional Center (SCCC), and the Jamestown Public Schools for narcotics sniffs inside the facilities.

The K9 Team's CFS breakdown is as follows:

-Schools:	3
-Jail/Prison:	4
-Vehicle/Building sniffs:	7
-Buildings/Patrol Search:	1
-SOT Callouts:	2

The K9 team is always ready to assist with the Special Operations Team (SOT), but depending on the call, we may not be utilized. This past year, the team was utilized in two SOT Callouts. We continue to train with SOT so the K9 team is prepared, and SOT members are used to having the K9 on a call if needed.

Every year the K9 Team needs to be certified and is currently certified through the National Police Canine Association (NPCA). The K9 Team is certified in Narcotics Detection (Methamphetamine, Marijuana, Cocaine, and Heroin), and Patrol (Obedience, recalling, apprehension, and a verbal release after an apprehension).

This past fall, the department has purchased and trained another K9 (K9 Briggs), and he is teamed with Officer Beckman. This year (2023), K9 Odin will be retiring due to his age. We are continuing to assist the new K9 Team with training and passing along knowledge and skills that we have learned over the course of the past 6 years.

The K9 Team is continually training to better serve.

2022 Canine Year End Report

K-9 Briggs and I are the newest K-9 Team with the Jamestown Police Department. I started out 2022 by fund raising through grants and donations from the Community which fully funded the purchase of the new K-9 and the Training needed.

Briggs is a 1-year-old German Shepard from Slovakia as a Green Dog, which means he came with no training. This method of using a Green Dog is to have a better bond with the handler and potentially a longer term of Service. I received Briggs in the Middle of July and August we attended a 12-week school in Buffalo Minnesota.

Through this training Briggs was trained in obedience, Narcotic Detection, Apprehension, and Tracking. By the end of Training Briggs and I became certified in Patrol and Narcotic Detection through the National Police Canine Association (NPCA). Briggs and I also Certified in Narcotic Detection through the United States Police Canine Association (USPCA). Which each Narcotic certification Briggs was imprinted on the Odors of Methamphetamines, Cocaine, Heroin, and Ecstasy (MDMA).

K-9 Briggs and I will be used to assist the James Valley Special Operations Team (JSOT), Narcotic Detection, Tracking, and Building Searches.

After Certification in October Briggs and I have had a total of 10 Calls for Service for the year of 2022. These calls for Service have been a mix of Vehicle/building Sniffs and Public Relations. With these Calls for Service, we have assisted North Dakota Highway Patrol, Stutsman County Sheriff's Department, Stutsman County Drug Task Force, and the Jamestown Police Department.

2022 SCHOOL PROGRAMS:

The School Resource Officer of the Jamestown Police Department gave 53 presentations to school age children in 2022. The following programs were included in those presentations.

Meet a Police Officer: Students meet a Police Officer and learn about good citizenship, responsibility and the duties of Police Officers.

Beware of Strangers: Instructions to students about safety with strangers. Topics include who a stranger is, rides from strangers and good and bad touches.

Halloween Safety: Instructions on Halloween safety rules. Topics include traffic safety, costumes, treats, stranger safety and Halloween courtesy.

Crime Prevention: Program designed to teach crime prevention, crime detection and crime reporting. Topics include the job of a Police Officer, how to detect, prevent and report crimes.

Bike Safety: Program designed to teach safe bike riding. Topics include bike traffic safety rules, accident prevention, locking and licensing bikes.

Home Alone Safety: Reviews the safety skills children need when they are home alone. Topics include crime prevention, first aid and the use of emergency phone number 911.

Arson Awareness Program: An informative look at the dangers involved in the misuse of lighters and matches. Students are reminded that matches and lighters are dangerous tools and when they are misused, they can cause injury, death and the destruction of property. Students are advised to receive proper instruction on how to use matches and lighters from an adult. Examples of the misuse of fire are given along with safety information on how to prevent fires.

School Resource Officer Report

2022

In January 2021, I became the School Resource Officer for the Jamestown Police Department.

This school year I worked as the SRO January 2022- May 2022. I work in seven different schools which include five elementary schools, Jamestown Middle School and Jamestown High School. I was placed on light duty in March 2022 due to my pregnancy. I resigned from the SRO position and Officer Scott Geiszler was assigned as the SRO and was placed in that role in August 2022.

The SRO office is at the Jamestown High School, where it is equipped with a school computer, allowing access to all seven school cameras.

Classes taught at the elementary level are, meet a police officer (Kindergarten), Latch Key Program (Home Alone Safety) (4th Grade) this class I am assisted by the Jamestown Fire Department, Halloween Safety (1st Grade), the Jamestown Fire Department assists with this class as well. Beware of Strangers (2nd Grade), Seatbelt Safety (3rd Grade), Arson Awareness (5th Grade), this class the Fire Department also assists with. Bike Safety (1st, 3rd, and 5th Grade), Summer Safety (Kindergarten). For these classes, each elementary school is assigned a different day Monday- Friday.

As a School Resource Officer, you are placed in many different roles. There are some students who have not had good interactions with police officers in the past. The SRO is there to build relationships with the students and staff, being seen and engaging with students and staff, preventing, and investigating crimes. All these things improve the safety of the school.

The SRO also attends sporting events, hockey, football, basketball etc. This shows students the SRO is invested. It also allows the parents and family members of students to see the interactions with students and understand that the SRO Job and police presence is not something to be worried about.

The SRO position is something of a community relations position. Many students, staff, parents like to know what the day-to-day activities consists of. Every day is different, some days are slower than others and some days the SRO is needed at multiple places at once. Each call is different. Many are labeled Disorderly Conduct, but they are never the same. The types of calls include, Disorderly Conducts (24), Unruly Juveniles(15), Tobacco Violations (2), Accidents, Juvenile Runaways (4), Welfare Check, Simple Assaults, SRO Prevention / Education (60), Public Relations. There were many CFS's made but these are the most common. I had approximately 220 calls, for the time the students were in school January 2022- May 2022.

No Officer attended Prom or Post Prom due to the fact that Prom was scheduled on the same day as the Running of the Green.

National Night Out is a nation-wide event that is held on August 3rd. It allows for the community to come and interact with the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Jamestown Fire Department, Jamestown Rural Fire Department, Jamestown Ambulance. The community gets the opportunity to ask questions and see our gear and patrol units. There are activities and food provided for the community.

Every Wednesday, I attended the Stutsman County/ Barnes County Juvenile Drug Court Program. Juvenile Drug Court is a program for youth that have been in trouble with drug use and juvenile court deems it necessary and that the juvenile could benefit from being in this program. Most of the participants are from the Jamestown or Valley City area. Once the juvenile is in the program, they are monitored much closer by the Drug Court Team, which meets every Wednesday. The participants must complete community service hours, community programs, they are drug tested frequently and are encouraged to make positive choices. If they fail to follow the court order each week or get into further trouble, they have sanctions, which are determined by the Team. I attended this program as a representative of the Jamestown Police Department. The Jamestown participants I have rapport with from being the SRO. I believe my participation in Drug Court is a positive one for the participant, showing them, I am there to support them and encourage them to make those positive choices. This program is a national program, and in some areas, they also have Adult Drug Court. The time the participants spend in the Drug Court Program is based on how well the participant does and their willingness to not use drugs and follow the program rules.

The School Resource Officer role is an important role for the community, Jamestown Public Schools, and the Jamestown Police Department. Without this role the officers on patrol would be responsible for responding to the calls at the school. That would make the task more difficult, leaving the rest of the community without an officer, also making it harder for each officer to get to know the students they are being called to the schools for. Having an SRO gives that officer time to get to know these students and the opportunity to build a relationship with them. Many students prefer to speak with the SRO, rather than another officer on duty, as the SRO is a familiar face.

SRO Report Fall 2022/2023

In August 2022, I started my role as JHS School Resource Officer. The school district consisted of Jamestown High School, Career and Technology, Jamestown Middle School, Gussner Elementary, Washington Elementary, Lincoln Elementary, Roosevelt Elementary, and Louis Lamoure Elementary.

During the Fall of 2022, I taught Meet A Police Officer (Kindergarten), Latch Key Program (4 Grade), Fire Prevention (3 Grade), Halloween Safety (1 Grade), and Beware of Strangers (2 Grade).

I participated in the Juvenile Drug Court Program which met every Wednesday. Other participants in this program included employees from the school district, Human Service Center, Sandness Law Firm, and court officials to include a District Court Judge. The basis of this program is to assist juveniles who struggle with substance abuse and provides resources for rehabilitation outside a detention setting.

From the beginning of the 2022/2023 school year to the end of December, 2022 I attended approximately 1 Swim Meet, 7 Football Games, 2 Soccer Games, 2 Volleyball Games, 2 Hockey Games, and 10 Basketball Games totaling approximately 24 JHS Sporting Events.

Also, I spoke with JHS and JMS staff about Active Shooter/Active Threat response and conducted 1 Active Shooter Lockdown Drill at JHS and JMS. I spoke with Elementary School staff about this as well. In October, 2022 there was a reported Active Shooter at Jamestown High School. Law Enforcement Officers responded and found the incident to be a hoax. I assisted with the initial response and student reunification as well.

I assisted in scheduling and conducting K-9 searches at Jamestown High School.

RECORDS SECTION:

The most notable change was Theft of Property offenses decreased in 2022 from 126 reportable offenses in 2021 to 89 in 2022. Another area of decreased reportable offenses were the Criminal Mischief offenses which were down from 171 in 2021 to 138 in 2022. Theft from Motor Vehicle offenses have increased in 2022 to 64 reportable offenses as compared to 43 in 2021. Other individual reportable offense categories were comparable to the numbers in 2021. The Jamestown Police Department had 54 reportable offenses categories in this section.

Adult arrests have decreased in 2022 with 662 arrests in 2022 compared to 773 arrests in 2021. The following is a breakdown of the main group “A” offenses:

The most notable change was arrests for Contempt of Court Warrant arrests decreased in 2022 from 153 arrests in 2021 to 83 in 2022. Criminal Trespassing arrests were also down in 2022 from 31 arrests in 2021 to 13 arrests in 2022. Other individual arrest categories were very comparable to the number received in 2021.

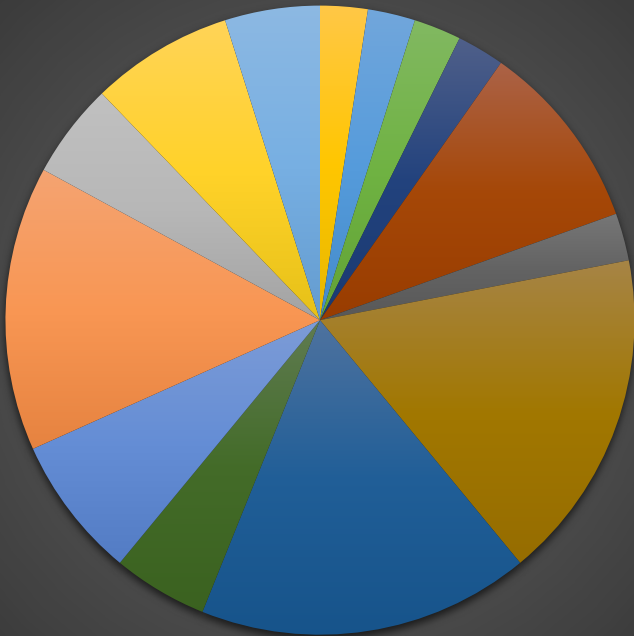

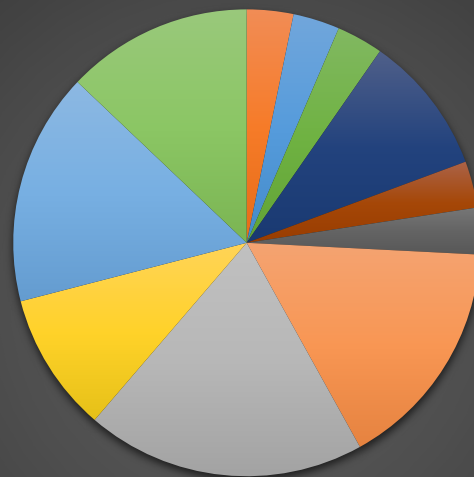

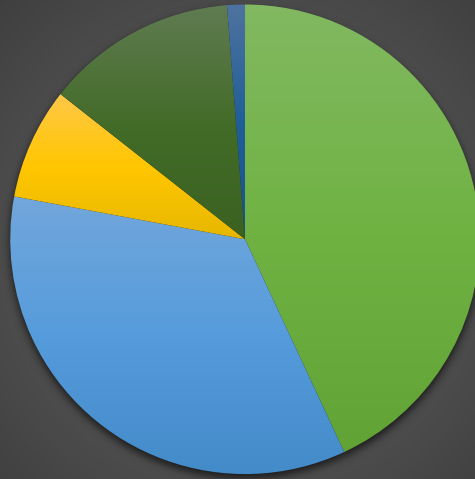

Annual Report

The Jamestown Special Operations Team (JSOT) is a combined agency Special Operations Team that has members from the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Valley City Police Department, and Barnes County Sheriff's Office, and Barnes County Ambulance Service. 2022 saw personnel changes on the team. Stutsman County Sergeant Brian Davis retired from the team after 8 years of dedicated service. Jamestown Police Officers Dan Ohde and Jordan Kynaston resigned from the Jamestown Police Department in 2022. Joining the team in 2022 were Jamestown Police Officers Scott Geiszler, Dustin Mittleider, Zach Chapin, Drew Topp, and Jacob Zielinski. This brought team membership to JPD with 11 officers, K9 Odin, and 1 administrative assistant, SCSO with 2 deputies, BCSO with 1 deputy, and VCPD with 1 officer. JSOT continues to utilize trained CNT negotiators from JRCC under the direction of Captain Brian Dreher. The tactical medical team consists of Dr. English and 2 Barnes County Ambulance Paramedics.

The team is currently comprised of 15 officers, K9 Odin, and 3 medical staff who are trained in special weapons and tactics to include: command and leadership, entry tactics, CQB, sniper, chemical munitions, impact munitions, breaching, armored vehicle operations, tactical medical, hostage rescue, K9 tracking and apprehension, and Tactical Combat Casualty Care.

Each year JSOT strives to provide quality training to its members. The team completed annual minimum training hours to remain a certified SWAT team set forth by the ND Special Operations Committee. Team members completed CBRNE training in Anniston, Alabama at the Center for Domestic Preparedness. Team members completed Law Enforcement Total Breaching at TEES in Byhalia, Mississippi and added mechanical, thermal, ballistic, and explosive breaching capabilities to the team. JSOT hosted the NTOA team leader course and trained two Sergeants as team leaders. Team members also attended the State SOC Convention and NTOA National Convention.

In 2022 JSOT responded to several high risk calls and events. A criminal barricade situation was resolved in August. The team utilized CNT, armored vehicles, chemical munitions, UAS platform, tactical robot, and K9 to take a subject armed with a knife into custody. In October, JSOT conducted a high risk vehicle stop on a subject who was implicated in the thefts of 2 firearms. That resulted in 2 additional high risk search warrants being conducted by the team at a local motel and a residence during that investigation. JSOT also provided security details for a high profile funeral and a court appearance in Foster County.

JSOT responded as part of a multijurisdictional response to the Jamestown High School in October for a reported active shooter situation. The call was ultimately determined to be a hoax, but was treated at the time as an active situation with the entire facility being searched by team personnel in a coordinated effort.

JSOT has added specialized equipment to further increase officer safety and increase our mission capabilities. New breaching equipment, thermal imagers, additional throwbots, pole cams, MultiRae gas monitors, hazmat suits, explosive detectors, and Tru Defender substance analyzers, and new air purifying respirators.

JSOT members continue to reinstruct important topics to the patrol level personnel to better prepare officers for the increased demand put on them as the first responders to dangerous situations. JSOT members instruct the following: firearms, less lethal impact munitions, tactical medical, breaching, and CQB.

JSOT will continue to provide a well trained and dedicated group of officers to the region to respond to incidents that require specialized training and personnel. We plan on getting the new members to SWAT Basic and 2 veteran officers to Sniper Basic in 2023. A new canine will be integrated into the team and officers sent to SKIDDS. JSOT will again look to add new equipment and training to add capabilities or enhance existing capabilities for the safety of our community.

STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE YEAR END REPORT 2022

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional and multi-agency Task Force covering the counties of Stutsman, Barnes, LaMoure, Eddy, and Foster. The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is dedicated to the identification, investigation, and prosecution of the individuals involved in the use, manufacturing, and distribution of controlled substances.

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is made up of four (4) sworn Law Enforcement Officers. Deputy John Hirschert, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for seven (7) years, Officer Joe Gushwa, with the Jamestown Police Department, just recently took the place of Officer Jordan Kynaston, Deputy Doug Muske, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for fifteen (15) years and is stationed in Barnes County. Special Agent Troy Kelly has been supervising the Task Force for ten (10) years. The officers are assigned to work certain areas, but the officers have been deputized in all five (5) of the counties that are part of the Task Force and must share the responsibility for all of the counties involved.

The Task Force had a total of 61 cases in 2022, which is up from the previous year. The Task Force initiated 53 cases and assisted other agencies with 8 cases. Both the number of initiated cases is up from last year along with the number of assist cases. Of the 53 initiated cases, the Task Force had 62 arrests, and many still pending, related to drug related offenses such as Possession of Controlled Substances, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Manufacture of a Controlled Substance, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance.

In 2022, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 311 ounces of marijuana with an approximate street value of \$108,850. This number is up again from last year and does not include edible THC and liquid THC. Along with the 311 ounces of raw marijuana, the Task Force seized/purchased 52 grams/dosage units of concentrated THC, edible THC, and liquid THC. During the year the Task Force investigated one (1) marijuana grow with 41 total plants being seized.

In 2022, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 70 ounces of methamphetamine with an approximate street value of \$70,000. This number is up over three (3) times from the amount seized/purchased last year. The Task Force continues to see the overall street value of methamphetamines dropping resulting in the influx in the amount of methamphetamines being seized. Methamphetamine sales/distribution continues to be one of the larger problems in the area.

In 2022, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 275 dosage units of controlled prescription drugs, LSD, and MDMA, which only slightly down from last year.

In 2022, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 1 gram of Psilocybin mushrooms which is down from last year, although the Task Force did dismantle a mushroom grow during the year that doesn't count towards this number.

In 2022, the Task Force seized nearly 294 pounds of cocaine with an approximate street value of \$5,000,125.

Besides initiating/assisting on cases, Task Force continues to provide free teaching and training in the school systems, businesses, and special interest groups throughout the area covered by the Task Force. The Task Force also continues to maintain the prescription drug take back in the area.

In summary, in 2022 the Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force initiated/assisted 61 cases involving the seizure/purchase of marijuana, methamphetamine, MDMA, psilocybin, cocaine, and prescription-controlled substances. The Task Force removed a substantial quantity of illegal narcotics, and distributors/manufacturers of those narcotics, from the streets and communities in Stutsman County, LaMoure County, Barnes County, Eddy County, and Foster County.

*Note: Several cases are still at the State Lab of Toxicology being analyzed. Actual weights would be higher. Several cases have yet to be forwarded for formal complaints. Actual arrests would be higher.

REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE

2022 ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT:

In 2022, there were a total of 823 calls pertaining to animals. Most of these calls were to complain about animals at large or being a nuisance. 33 of these calls were regarding people being bitten by animals. 7 calls were to investigate cruelty to animals. These calls for service, along with routine patrol, resulted in 140 animals being impounded. These animals were handled as follows:

There was a total of 18 animal arrests for the year 2022.

There were 126 dog licenses and 28 cat licenses issued in 2022 as well as permits for 7 private kennels and 0 commercial kennels. The total cost of veterinary fees in 2022 was \$194.00. This includes testing cost for rabies evaluation.

This year the Jamestown Police Department assisted with impounding 14 dogs and 1 pig for the ND Highway Patrol and Stutsman County Sheriff's Department. The rescue groups continue to donate food and treats for the animals at the pound and assist with transporting animals to keep euthanasia rates down. The animals euthanized were feral, aggressive or severely injured.
