# PUBLIC RELATIONS & SPECIAL SERVICES


#### **PUBLIC RELATIONS:**

Identity theft and scam education continue to be very popular and requested classes are given by the Detective Division of the Jamestown Police Department.

Other presentations were given to various groups covering traffic laws, domestic violence, duties of police officer, sexual assault or other police related topics as requested. At the Jamestown Police Department, we feel it is necessary to be involved with the community and interact with them and we will continue to do that.

The Jamestown Police Departments Facebook page is used to make public service announcements, offer crime prevention tips and as a public relations tool to make people aware of the programs and activities that the Police Department and/or our officers are involved in. Facebook has changed the way that they track statistics and it appears to be a more accurate reflection of what is occurring. They now list the number of occurrences for the year and the percentage of increase over the prior year. So, for 2023 the number of people reached was 312,243 an increase of 13.1% from 2022, Page visits was 64,415 an increase of 104.4% from 2022 and New Likes and Follows was 391 a decrease of 51.1% from 2022. Based on these increases it is clear that our Facebook page continues to be an excellent tool for interacting with the citizens of Jamestown.





Police Department tours offer the opportunity to become informed on the operation of the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Communications Center and the Stutsman County Correctional Center.

#### **GAMING ENFORCEMENT:**

The department's gaming enforcement program works towards the goal of ensuring that those who conduct or play the games of chance in Jamestown are protected by the state gaming rules. To accomplish these goals, the Jamestown Police Department, working with the ND State Gaming Office, review complaints of gaming violations.

#### **BICYCLES:**

In 2023 there was a total of 1 bicycle license sold. There were 9 bikes reported stolen with a total of 15 abandoned or stolen bikes recovered in 2023.

#### 2023 Canine Year End Report

K-9 Briggs and I finished our second year together serving Jamestown Police Department and the surrounding areas. Briggs and I logged a total of 59 deployments for 2023 ranging from Vehicle/Building Sniffs, and Tracking/Patrol. Briggs and I continue to serve on the Jamestown Special Operations Team (JSOT) and were used several times on our SWAT Call Outs. Briggs and I also assisted Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Stutsman County Drug Task Force, North Dakota Highway Patrol, Parole and Probation, Carrington Police Department, and JRCC. We recertified in Narcotic Detection and Patrol through the NPCA in June which was located at the Princeton Police Department in Princeton, MN. Briggs and I logged a total of 146.5 training hours in the year 2023. During these training exercises Briggs located 606 grams of Methamphetamine, 768 grams of Heroin, and 77 grams of Cocaine. Briggs and I continue to train to better serve the Community and surrounding area.

-Vehicle/Building Sniffs: 46 with 26 indications and 8 arrests

Seizing 47.35 Grams of Methamphetamine, 2 items of Fentanyl, and 14 items of controlled medications. Also seized 32 items of Drug Paraphernalia.

#### **2023 SCHOOL PROGRAMS:**

The School Resource Officer of the Jamestown Police Department gave 44 presentations to school age children in 2023. The following programs were included in those presentations.

Meet a Police Officer: Students meet a Police Officer and learn about good citizenship, responsibility and the duties of Police Officers.

Beware of Strangers: Instructions to students about safety with strangers. Topics include who a stranger is, rides from strangers and good and bad touches.

Halloween Safety: Instructions on Halloween safety rules. Topics include traffic safety, costumes, treats, stranger safety and Halloween courtesy.

Crime Prevention: Program designed to teach crime prevention, crime detection and crime reporting. Topics include the job of a Police Officer, how to detect, prevent and report crimes.

Bike Safety: Program designed to teach safe bike riding. Topics include bike traffic safety rules, accident prevention, locking and licensing bikes.

Home Alone Safety: Reviews the safety skills children need when they are home alone. Topics include crime prevention, first aid and the use of emergency phone number 911.

Arson Awareness Program: An informative look at the dangers involved in the misuse of lighters and matches. Students are reminded that matches and lighters are dangerous tools and when they are misused, they can cause injury, death and the destruction of property. Students are advised to receive proper instruction on how to use matches and lighters from an adult. Examples of the misuse of fire are given along with safety information on how to prevent fires.

#### SRO Report Fall 2023/2024

In August 2023, I started my second year as JHS School Resource Officer. The school district consisted of Jamestown High School, Career and Technology, Jamestown Middle School, Gussner Elementary, Washington Elementary, Lincoln Elementary, Roosevelt Elementary, and Louis Lamoure Elementary.

During the Spring of 2023 I taught Seat Belt Safety (3 Grade), Arson Awareness (5 Grade), and Bike Safety (1 Grade, 3 Grade, 5 Grade). During the Fall of 2023, I taught Latch Key Program (4 Grade), Fire Prevention (3 Grade), Halloween Safety (1 Grade), and Beware of Strangers (2 Grade).

I participated in the Juvenile Drug Court Program which met every Wednesday and later switched to Monday. Other participants in this program included employees from the school district, Human Service Center, Sandness Law Firm, and court officials to include a District Court Judge. The basis of this program is to assist juveniles who struggle with substance abuse and provides resources for rehabilitation outside a detention setting.

From the beginning of the 2023/2024 school year to the end of December 2023, I attended approximately 35 JPS events totaling approximately 99.25 hrs.

Also, I spoke with JHS and JMS staff about Active Shooter/Active Threat response and conducted Active Shooter Lockdown Drill at JPS Schools. I spoke with Elementary School staff about this as well.

In the beginning of the school year, I presented a proposal to the Jamestown Public Schools Board requesting JPS purchase a patrol vehicle for the SRO. Working with JPS and JPD administration, the proposal became a reality, and a vehicle was purchased for the SRO position. I worked with JPD Administration to get the vehicle equipped with the necessary equipment and was given the opportunity to work with a design company for the Police decals for said vehicle.

## RECORDS & STATISTICS

#### **RECORDS SECTION:**

*Reportable offenses* (those that are reported to the FBI) were up in 2023. There were 885 reportable offenses in 2022 and 935 in 2023. The following is a breakdown of the main group "A" offenses:

<u>Assaults:</u> 2023: 176	2022:154	2021: 179
<u>Sex Offenses:</u> 2023: 32	2022: 34	2021: 24
<b>Thefts / Fraud:</b> 2023: 375	2022: 384	2021: 456
<u>Drug Offenses:</u> 2023: 126	2022: 94	2021: 143

The most notable change was Theft of Property offenses increased in 2023 from 89 reportable offenses in 2022 to 119 in 2023. Another area of increased reportable offenses was the Possession of Drug Paraphernalia offenses which increased from 46 in 2022 to 67 in 2023. Theft from Motor Vehicle offenses have decreased in 2023 from 64 reportable offenses in 2022 to 37 in 2023. Burglary offenses also decreased in 2023 from 58 reportable offenses in 2022 to 38 in 2023. Other individual reportable offense categories were comparable to the numbers in 2022. The Jamestown Police Department had 51 reportable offenses categories in this section.

*Adult arrests* have increased in 2023 with 704 arrests in 2023 compared to 662 arrests in 2022. The following is a breakdown of the main group "A" offenses:

The most notable change for 2023 was Consumption of Alcohol by Minor arrests increased in 2023 from 9 arrests in 2022 to 34 in 2023. Possession of Drug Paraphernalia arrests were also up in 2023 from 45 arrests in 2022 to 64 arrests in 2023. Domestic Assault adult arrests decreased in 2023 from 59 arrests in 2022 to 37 arrests in 2023. Other individual arrest categories were very comparable to the number received in 2022.

*Juvenile referrals* had a slight increase in 2023 from 304 referrals in 2022 to 310 referrals in 2023. The following is a breakdown of the main group "A" offenses:

## **Annual Report**



The Jamestown Special Operations Team (JSOT) is a combined agency Special Operations Team that has members from the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Valley City Police Department, and Barnes County Sheriff's Office, and Barnes County Ambulance Service. 2023 had minimal personnel changes to the team. Team membership changed as Officer Zielinski moved to a position with SCSO. That brought JPD to 10 officers, K9 Odin retired, K9 Briggs was brought on board, and 1 administrative assistant, SCSO with 3 deputies, BCSO with 1 deputy, and VCPD with 1 officer. JSOT continues to utilize trained CNT negotiators from JRCC under the direction of Captain Brian Dreher. The tactical medical team consists of Dr. Inglish and 2 Barnes County Ambulance Paramedics.

The team is currently comprised of 15 officers, K9 Briggs, and 3 medical staff who are trained in special weapons and tactics to include: command and leadership, entry tactics, CQB, sniper, chemical munitions, impact munitions, breaching, armored vehicle operations, tactical medical, hostage rescue, K9 tracking and apprehension, and Tactical Combat Casualty Care.

Each year JSOT strives to provide quality training to its members. The team completed annual minimum training hours to remain a certified SWAT team set forth by the ND Special Operations Committee. Team members again completed Law Enforcement Total Breaching at TEES in Byhalia, Mississippi and added trained personnel in mechanical, thermal, ballistic, and explosive breaching capabilities for the team. Team members also attended the State SOC meetings and NTOA National Convention.

In 2023 JSOT responded to several high risk calls and events. JSOT was involved with High Risk criminal apprehensions in Jamestown and Carrington. They also executed a high risk warrant service with the SCNTF. JSOT responded to a bomb threat at the NDSH.

JSOT team members helped train local agencies in high risk event procedures and tactics to enhance officer safety on unknown calls.

JSOT has added specialized equipment to further increase officer safety and increase our mission capabilities. A new trailer to move equipment and new body armor was purchased in 2023 using grant money.

JSOT members continue to reinstruct important topics to the patrol level personnel to better prepare officers for the increased demand put on them as the first responders to dangerous situations. JSOT members instruct the following: firearms, less lethal impact munitions, tactical medical, breaching, and CQB.

JSOT will continue to provide a well trained and dedicated group of officers to the region to respond to incidents that require specialized training and personnel. JSOT will again look to

add new equipment and training to add capabilities or enhance existing capabilities for the safety of our community as well as several grant funded trainings and other advanced trainings.

#### STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE YEAR END REPORT 2023

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional and multi-agency Task Force covering the counties of Stutsman, Barnes, LaMoure, Eddy, and Foster. The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is dedicated to the identification, investigation, and prosecution of the individuals involved in the use, manufacturing, and distribution of controlled substances.

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is made up of four (4) sworn Law Enforcement Officers. Deputy John Hirchert, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for eight (8) years, Officer Joe Gushwa, with the Jamestown Police Department, has been a member for one (1) year, Deputy Doug Muske, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for sixteen (16) years and is stationed in Barnes County. Special Agent Troy Kelly has been supervising the Task Force for eleven (11) years. The officers are assigned to work certain areas, but the officers have been deputized in all five (5) of the counties that are part of the Task Force and must share the responsibility for all of the counties involved.

The Task Force had a total of 50 cases in 2023, which is down 10 cases from the previous. The Task Force initiated 42 cases and assisted other agencies with 8 cases. While looking at the stats and number of arrests, the number of cases being lower can be contributed to the complexity of the cases the Task Force has investigated and time taken to investigate those. Of the 42 initiated cases, the Task Force arrested 58 individuals for 129 offenses, and many still pending, related to drug related offenses such as Possession of Controlled Substances, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Manufacture of a Controlled Substance, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance.

In 2023, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 207 dosage units of fentanyl and counterfeit M30 pills which contain fentanyl, with an approximate street value of \$8,280. Stopping the distribution of fentanyl continues to be one of the primary problems the Task Force is combating.

In 2023, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 21 ounces of marijuana with an approximate street value of \$7,350. This number is down from last year and does not include edible THC and liquid THC. Along with the 21 ounces of raw marijuana, the Task Force seized/purchased 379 grams/dosage units of concentrated THC, edible THC, and liquid THC. Due to concentrated THC being observed in multiple forms and dosages, ranging from vape cartridges, "wax", gummies, lozenges, and other edibles, it is difficult to tally weights of these forms from milligrams, milliliters, and dosage units. During the year the Task Force investigated two (2) marijuana grows with five (5) total plants being seized. According to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), each marijuana plant is capable of producing one (1) pound of marijuana.

In 2023, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 12 ounces of methamphetamine with an approximate street value of \$33,600. This number is down from the amount seized/purchased last year. Although the amount seized is down from last year, methamphetamine sales/distribution continues to be one of the larger problems in the area.

In 2023, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 273 dosage units of controlled prescription drugs, LSD, and MDMA, which is almost the same as last year.

In 2023, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 52 grams of Psilocybin mushrooms which is more than the prior year.

In 2023, the Task Force seized nearly 27 grams of cocaine with an approximate street value of \$2,700.

Besides initiating/assisting on cases, Task Force continues to provide free teaching and training in the school systems, businesses, and special interest groups throughout the area covered by the Task Force. The Task Force also continues to maintain the prescription drug take back in the area and received over 91 pounds of prescription medication turned in by the communities.

In summary, in 2023 the Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force initiated/assisted 50 cases involving the seizure/purchase of marijuana, methamphetamine, MDMA, psilocybin, fentanyl, cocaine, and prescription-

controlled substances. The Task Force removed a substantial quantity of illegal narcotics, and distributors/manufacturers of those narcotics, from the streets and communities in Stutsman County, LaMoure County, Barnes County, Eddy County, and Foster County.

\*Note: Several cases are still at the State Lab of Toxicology being analyzed. Actual weights would be higher. Several cases have yet to be forwarded for formal complaints. Actual arrests would be higher.

REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE

#### **2023 ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT:**

In 2023, there were a total of 853 calls pertaining to animals. Most of these calls were to complain about animals at large or being a nuisance. 41 of these calls were regarding people being bitten by animals. 4 calls were to investigate cruelty to animals. These calls for service, along with routine patrol, resulted in 133 animals being impounded. These animals were handled as follows:

There was a total of 42 animal arrests for the year 2023.

There were 91 dog licenses and 24 cat licenses issued in 2023 as well as permits for 7 private kennels and 0 commercial kennels. The total cost of veterinary fees in 2023 was \$860.32. This includes testing cost for rabies evaluation.

This year the Jamestown Police Department assisted with impounding 4 animals for other law enforcement agencies. The rescue groups continue to donate food, treats, transport and medical needs to help keep costs down for the City Pound.

There were 4 aggressive dogs seized this year which required extra veterinary cost for sedation and euthanasia as the animals could not be safely handled. Also this year, there was a large colony of feral cats that were trapped and euthanized due to creating a nuisance in the neighborhood.
